Glossary

Terms	Information
Abenomics	Refers to the economic policies advocated by Shinzō Abe since the December 2012 general election, which elected Abe to his second term as Prime Minister of Japan. Abenomics is based upon “three arrows” of fiscal stimulus, monetary easing and structural reforms.
Administered prices	Inflation component in the form of prices of goods and service which is set (fixed) by Government.
Asset purchase facility	Facilities provided to purchase financial assets.
Austerity program	Government policies used to reduced deficit by spending cuts or tax increases.
Bail out	Loan injection to a company or country which faces serious financial difficulty or bankruptcy.
Balance Sheet	A financial statement that summarizes a company's assets, liabilities and shareholders' equity at a specific point in time.
Barrel	Measurement unit of volume that used in international oil trade.
Base money/monetary base	The money supply that consist of coins, paper money (both as bank vault cash and as currency circulating in the public), and commercial banks' reserves with the central bank.
Basel III	Global regulatory standards on bank soundness based on bank capital adequacy, stress testing and market liquidity risk. The members of the Basel Committee on Banking Supervision agreed this regulations will be implemented in 2013-2018.
BI rate	The policy rate reflecting the monetary policy stance adopted by Bank Indonesia and announced to the public.
Bid to cover ratio	The ratio is used to describe the level of demand for the securities during the bidding process / supply by comparing the amount or value of the offer and accepted.
Bid-ask spread	The difference in price between the highest price that a buyer is willing to pay for an asset and the lowest price for which a seller is willing to sell it.
Bond market	Market for government securities.
Branchless banking	Banking strategies to provide banking services without relying on the existence of a branch office.
Bullish	Tendency to rise.
Capital flows	The movement of money for the purpose of investment, trade or business production can be either inflow or outflow.
Capital inflow	Increase in the amount of money available from external or foreign sources for the purchase of local capital assets such buildings, land, machines.
Capital reversal	Sudden movement of capital outflow.
Capital spending	An amount spent to acquire or upgrade productive assets (such as buildings, machinery and equipment, vehicles) in order to increase the capacity or efficiency of a company for more than one accounting period.
Clean money policy	Meet the needs of the public for cash fit for circulation in adequate amounts and appropriate denominations.
Collateralized loan	A security backed by a pool of debt, often low-rated corporate loans.
Consensus forecast	Forecast derived from several forecasts (such as by averaging all forecasted quantities). It implies giving equal weight to all forecasts and the assumptions they are based on.
Core inflation	The persistent component within inflation movement, influenced by fundamentals such as supply-demand interaction; external environment: exchange rate, international commodity prices, trading partner inflation and inflation expectations.
Core-deposit	Banking deposits made by customers in the bank's general market area.
Cost of capital	The cost of funds used for financing a business.
Cost push inflation	A phenomenon in which the general price levels rise (inflation) due to increases in the cost of production factors.

Deposit facility	A standing facility of the central bank which counterparties may use to make overnight deposits, remunerated at a pre-specified interest rate, at a national central bank (NCB).

Fiscal Expansion	Fiscal government to encourage growth by changing the levels of spending or taxation.
Fiscal space	Flexibility of a government in its spending choice.
Fiscal Stimulus	Fiscal policy to boost economic by reduce tax burden and increase government expenditure.
